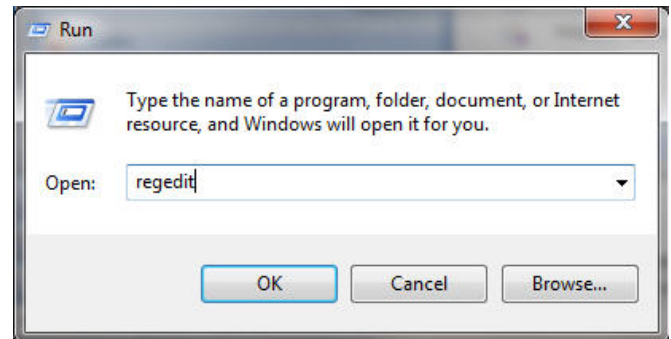


Registry Hack adds “Copy To” and “Move To” entries to the pop-up context menus in Windows Explorer

(works with Windows XP, Server 2003, Vista and Windows 7RC1)

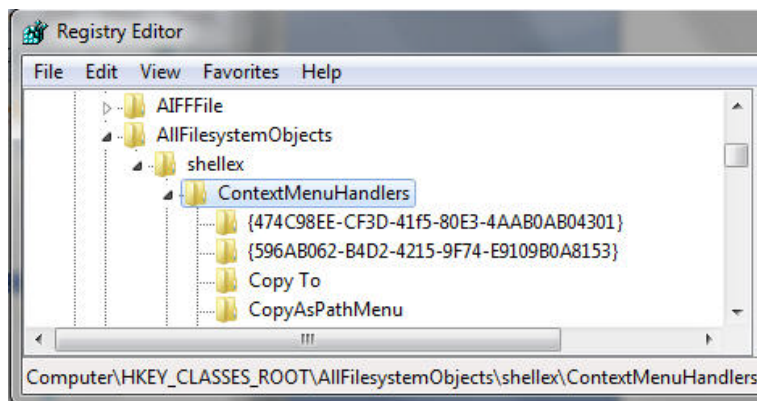
This process involves editing the Windows Registry. Making a mistake in the registry can turn your PC into a boat anchor or doorstop, depending on its size. Thus, BACK UP your registry before you begin and don't tinker if you don't understand what you're doing. In other words, the only person responsible for breaking your PC is you. :)

1. Open the Registry. Typically you can do so by clicking Start>Run and typing “regedit” in the run box and clicking OK.

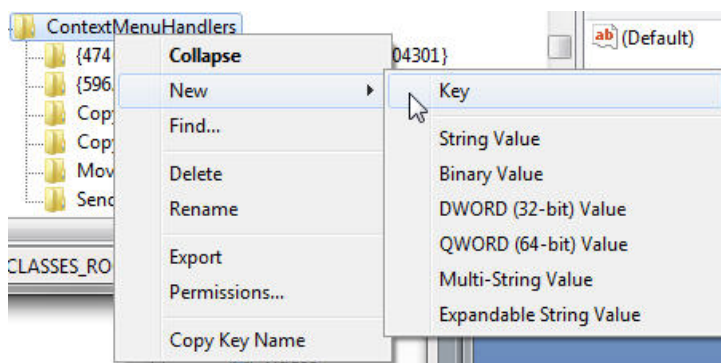


2. Navigate to this key in the Registry:


`HKEY_CLASSES_ROOT\AllFilesystemObjects\shell\ContextMenuHandlers`



3. Right-click on the title **ContextMenuHandlers** and select **New** and then **Key** from the resulting menus.

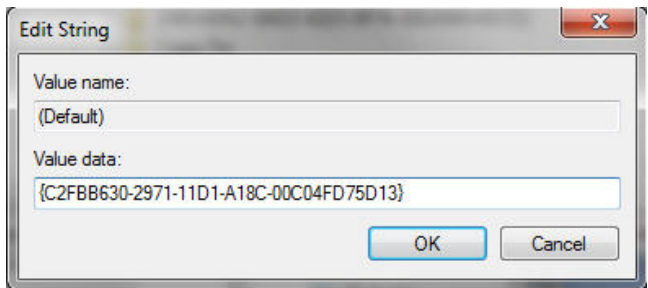


4. The new key will be created with the default name of *NewKey#1*, it should be highlighted so you can easily change the name. Type “**Copy To**” (without the quotes) over the highlighted key name to rename the new key.
5. Repeat step 3, only this time type “**Move To**” (without the quotes) to rename the new key.
6. Click on the *Copy To* key name you just created.


7. In the right side of the Registry UI, double-click  (Default) and type this value in the box (it is easier if you cut and paste it from here).

Value for **Copy To Key**: {C2FBB630-2971-11D1-A18C-00C04FD75D13}

NOTE: Be sure to include the brackets: { }! Click *OK* when finished.



8. Click on the *Move To* key you created earlier.

9. In the right side of the Registry UI, double-click  (Default) and type this value in the box (it is easier if you cut and paste it from here).

Value for **Move To Key** : {C2FBB631-2971-11D1-A18C-00C04FD75D13}

NOTE: Be sure to include the brackets: { }! Click *OK* when finished.

10. Close the Registry Editor by clicking the little **X** in the top-right corner (you do not need to save your changes, they are saved automatically as you make them...which is why it's important to be sure of what you are doing!!).

Now when you right click on an object in Windows Explorer, your menu will include the two new entries you created and clicking on one of them will allow you to move or copy files and folders quickly to other locations...and you can even create new folders in your destination at the same time as well.
